

She struggles with health issues. She's gone without electricity and water. And she's on a first-name basis with the code enforcement officer.

But Miss Glenda still finds a reason to smile.

"Every time we wake up and see another day, we're blessed," said this Duluth senior. "It's up to us to choose whether we're going to be happy that day or sad or grumpy, you know?"

Glenda, who has faced her fair share of home repairs, first bumped into Home Repairs Ministries through her church.

"Water had went through my ceiling, and I needed a large piece of sheetrock put up," she explained.

That's when one of her friends at Perimeter Church mentioned Home Repairs.

"They told me [at the time] that Miss Jan and Harvey Anderson do a ministry to help people with home repairs," she said.

She called the Andersons. And when she did, she discovered more than home repairs. Glenda found a whole

new crew of friends — just when she needed them most.

"My favorite men are Mark [Home Repairs' Executive Director] and Mr. Anderson and all of them," she said. "Mark is the new sheriff in town. He's a good guy. He has some good sidekicks. I call them my blessings. Some are from our church and some are from other churches. But they're all men of God. And they're all here for one reason — to spread the word of God and His love."

"They're not just Home Repairs Ministries to me," she added. "They're my extended family."

Over the years, volunteers have helped Glenda with a variety of projects. One project Glenda is especially grateful for? Her porch and porch steps.

"Mark said: 'We're going to take care of that.' They went to nailing and fixing. And I can go on my back porch now."

Volunteers support recovery in Gwinnett

Late last year, Home Repairs jumped at the chance to help with a one-of-a-kind project in Gwinnett — Lightway Recovery Wellness Center for Women. This project involved converting what was a bed and breakfast into a rehabilitation center for 33 women.

Our job? Help with the finish work needed for occupancy permits.

We started by covering about 500 feet of sprinkler pipes. From there, we installed fire-rated doors, bathroom doors, stairs, hardware, attic doors, finished trims, flooring, made adjustments, and more. Even though the Coronavirus had restricted our

project list, we were able to keep working at Lightway since the building isn't currently in use.

"It's always good to finish a home modification project that helps someone who is adopting or fostering children," he said. "I enjoy helping seniors and single moms who need small repairs but have no resource for materials or skill to fix it on their own."

John is also a financial supporter of Home Repairs Ministries.

"I decided to become a donor after seeing the need [in the community] and [realizing] my resources from God [that allowed me] to be able to help this ministry as well as others. It is in response to what Christ has done for me that I want to serve Him by serving others," he said.

Not only does John serve with Home Repairs, but he is also involved in Fully Furnished Ministries as well as in community outreach at Perimeter Church.

After 30 years as a UPS Industrial Engineer, John is now retired. He and his wife, Alice, have three married children and six grandkids who all live in Gwinnett and Forsyth county. While he loves having his family nearby, John also enjoys traveling, when he's not volunteering.

Speaking of volunteering, John hopes others get involved with Home Repairs.
